To every IMM meeting, the Instructors would haul bags of dry pens that were then delivered to Staples.

Over 4 years, 15,000+ pens were collected, recycled, and diverted away from the ever-growing landfill.

Although the project has concluded, the message was impactful and long lasting. We learned that a small amount of effort can have a ripple effect to help keep our earth healthy. Let us do the write thing by recycling one pen at time!
